## Winter Waters Around Alderney Teeming With Wildlife With A Humpback Whale, Dolphins and Tuna Spotted

The waters around Alderney are brimming with marine life this winter, with regular sightings of bottlenose dolphin and blue fin tuna—and now, an incredible appearance by a humpback whale.

Winter can be a good season for marine mammal sightings around Alderney, the northernmost of the Channel Islands. However, the recent flurry of activity, including large pods of dolphins spotted by AWT ecologists, kayakers and local fishermen, has been extraordinary. The highlight came with a humpback whale sighted to the northwest of Alderney's iconic Casquets Lighthouse.

A remarkable video of the whale breaching was shared on Facebook and has garnered significant attention. Watch the footage here.

The Alderney Wildlife Trust (AWT) conducts year-round monitoring of the island's waters, including extensive survey work in Alderney's Ramsar site, a wetland of international importance. This monitoring work helps to build a comprehensive photographic record of seals, dolphins, and other marine life that frequent the fast-flowing waters around the island.

AWT's work highlights the importance of understanding and protecting Alderney's rich marine ecosystem, which continues to surprise and inspire residents and visitors alike.
